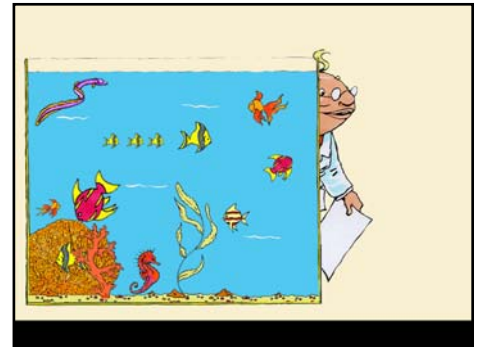
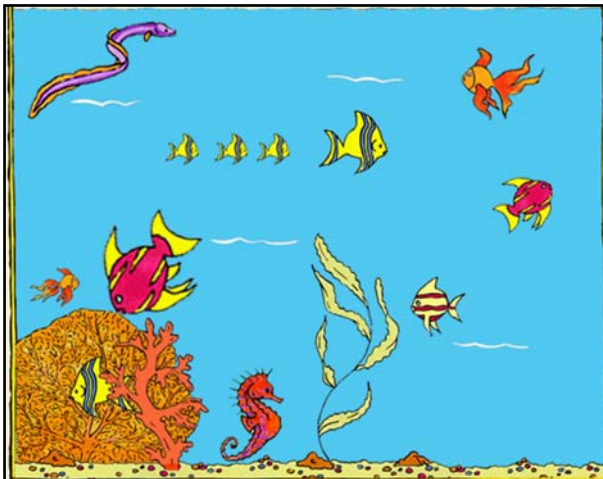


Professor Fish's Fish : A Professor and some very strange fish ...

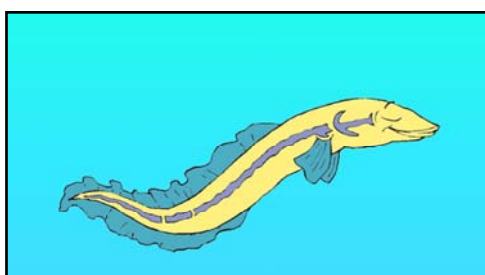
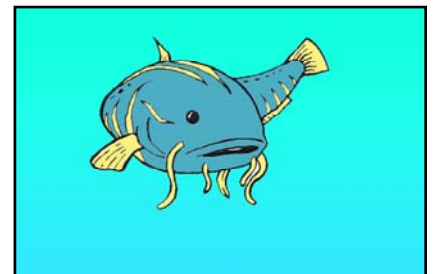

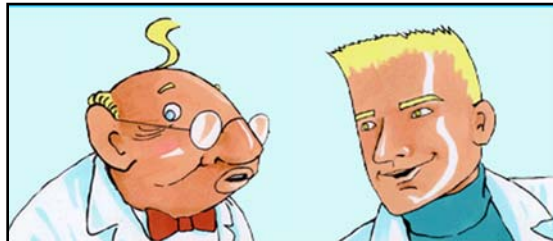

Bill Wordsmith : *Mr. Haddock, you work **with** Professor Fish. Can you tell me something about that?*

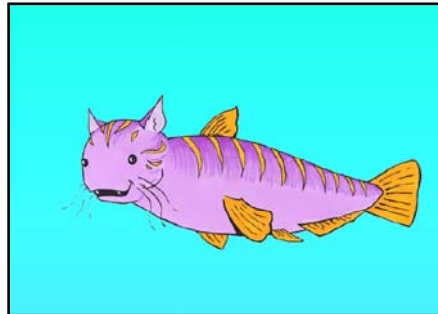

Bill Wordsmith : *Come forward and see the wonder of his lovely fish...*

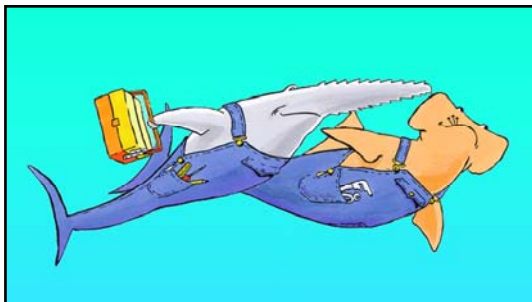
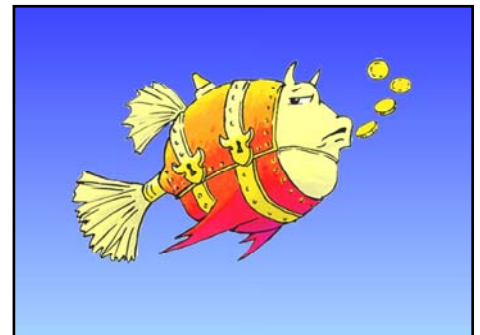
Professor Fish's Fish : An extraordinary collection (of fish!)
